The Highlands Steam and Vintage Fair at Oberon - 11 February

The early morning fog that camouflaged the road to Oberon last year was absent this time. The mystical township was still on top of the hill, at the end of the winding road. The sun was shining brightly and the temperature was rapidly rising. There was a warm breeze blowing, but it was better than no breeze at all.

The street parade signalled the start of the festivities. This year it was a bit different... There was an interesting event in a back street while others were lining up for the parade. Two of the steam powered traction engines were in a "drag race" to be first at the start. The thought of a drag race conjures up the image of roaring engines, screeching tyres, smoke and high speed. Well there was certainly smoke but that's where it ended. All on-coming traffic had to take evasive action or become scrap metal. Boys and girls from the Scots School, Bathurst made up the only pipe band to lead the procession from the northern end of town to the Showground. Following directly behind the band were four steam traction engines including the two "dragsters". They were followed by vintage, classic and sporty cars, tractors and trucks.

At the showground, the entry road was lined on both sides with stalls selling a variety of trinkets, collectables, crafts, food, drinks and ice cream, etc.

Also at the grounds was a unique tricycle ridden by an equally uniquely dressed rider. The tricycle was an "1826 Coventry

Rotary tricycle" owned and ridden by John Kitchen from Bathurst. John is a master bicycle frame builder. He specialises in Penny Farthing bicycles, tandems and tricycles.

Standing out, in a corner of the paddock surrounded by beautiful vintage and classic cars, was a pre-1930's
Dodge Brothers tray back truck with timber cabin and tray with timber rail drop sides. It was clearly in need of restoration. A sign by the owner listed parts he was looking for and information where they could be obtained.

As the temperature soared towards the mid 40's people sought out shade wherever they could find it. Some people hid under umbrellas, some wore hats with very broad brims and cool drinks were in high demand.



A strong wind arrived just before 1.00pm blowing dust all over the place and causing items not secured to fly with the dust.

As in previous years this year's Highland Steam and Vintage Fair had its own unique attractions which makes each year worthwhile to visit Oberon again.
